

SUMMARY OF THE EDUCATION IMPLEMENTATION PLAN FOR THE ANISHINABEK NATION EDUCATION AGREEMENT

Chapter 19 of the Anishinabek Nation Education Agreement requires the development of an Education Implementation Plan to guide the implementation of the Education Agreement by the First Nations and the Government of Canada. While not a legal agreement, the Education Implementation Plan was negotiated and comes into effect on April 1, 2018.

The Education Implementation Plan:

- (a) identifies the obligations of the First Nations, the Kinooomaadziwin Education Body and the Government of Canada under the Anishinabek Nation Education Agreement;
- (b) identifies the activities to be undertaken to fulfill those obligations and the responsible party; and
- (c) identifies the timeframe for the completion of implementation activities.

The details on the activities are set out in project sheets. The projects covered in the Education Implementation Plan are set out below.

- Project #1: Exercise of Education Law-Making Power and Other Authority in Relation to Primary, Elementary and Secondary Education
- Project #2: Education Standards and Transferability
- Project #3: Establish a Public Registry of Laws
- Project #4: Establish a Repository of Laws
- Project #5: Input into Proposed Laws or Decisions
- Project #6: Participation in Anishinaabe Institutions
- Project #7: Appeal or Review of Education Administrative Decisions
- Project #8: Delivery and Access to Primary, Elementary and Secondary Education
- Project #9: Establish and Maintain an Education Information System
- Project #10: Establishment of the Kinooomaadziwin Education Body
- Project #11: Transfer Payments
- Project #12: Canada's New International Legal Obligations
- Project #13: Canada's Compliance with Its International Legal Obligations
- Project #14: Relationship between this Education Agreement and the Anishinabek Nation Governance Agreement
- Project #15: Develop a Process to Amend this Education Agreement
- Project #16: Additional Parties
