- Datasets and reports are provided by the Offord Centre to the KEB, with First Nation consent.



National Indigenous History Month

During the month of June, the KEB released 14 activities for National Indigenous History Month. The daily activities ran from June 1st until June 21st for all classrooms to participate in and learn more about Indigenous culture. The activities included a language lesson (how to introduce yourself in Anishinaabemowin), the Seven Grandfather teachings, an Eagle Feather teaching, a semaa teaching, stories, and then the final day ended with a scavenger hunt.

Classrooms had the opportunity to submit photos of their participation each day, to be entered into a daily prize draw.

Nine schools throughout Ontario submitted photos to the daily draw. Some schools had multiple classrooms participating! Classroom submissions ranged from kindergarten to grade 8. Submissions came from Sturgeon Falls, Long Lake #58 First Nation, Angus, Chatham, North Bay, Birch Island, two homeschooled families, and more!

Region 4

28th Annual Lunaape Traditional Gathering

Munsee-Delaware Nation had their 28th annual Traditional Gathering on June 30, July I and 2, 2023. The three-day event was more than just a pow wow for the First Nation. The Lunaape people have a huge focus on strengthening their language and culture. An information booth was set-up at the gathering that shared about Lunaape history, culture and language. This event is another reflection of the community's dedication to language and culture revitalization. In 2021-2022, Munsee-Delaware completed a Niigaan Gdizhaami Fund project that collected history and stories of the community to develop grade 10 history curriculum with the Thames Valley District School Board.





Chippewas of Rama First Nation

Chippewas of Rama First Nation is fostering an in-community language immersion program that is connected to existing early years learning centres. Preparation in-community includes first language speakers in the community pairing with second-language teachers. As in many of our First Nations, the teachers are second language learners who work hard at approaching fluency. The immersion program is being managed and implemented by Jessica Shonias.

The backbone of the program is about developing the skills of members who are Registered Early Childcare Educator's and members of the Ontario Teachers College by working with first speakers and through attending immersion-based adult learning summer programs. Beginning this fall, teachers will work with children in an immersed setting. Stay tuned for updates on the program!
