

Region 1

Following his teachings of giving away his first catch, Parken donated his moose to his school. A big thanks to community member Charlotte Thompson, who shared teachings and helped the teachers and students, cut, wrap, and package. All the meat was given to families.

The students have also begun gathering medicines for the winter, and they will participate in making mukwamide and canning before they begin trapping until Christmas.

<u>Region 2</u> Cultural Educator at Shawanosowe School Phase 2

Whitefish River First Nation - The cultural educator recently collaborated with teachers on lesson planning and created a bank of lesson plans and units specific to Shawanosowe School. They also worked collaboratively with the classroom teachers to plan events, land-based activities, trips, and cultural teachings.

"There were several students who had generally been struggling in math and, at times, resisting participating in math. With the kinesthetic learning with beading and coding, these students were highly engaged and most proud to show their work to teachers and their parents."

Students were heard making statements such as "this is not math, this is fun!"

With the help of the Cultural Coordinator, students undertook a month-long project to design and sew their own ribbon skirts and shirts. One student who had difficulty focusing on any given task for more than a few minutes, was incredibly proud of his vest and regalia during the school's powwow. Not only did he dance for most of the powwow, but he also spent an entire hour seated and drummed with the community's drum group. This was a major accomplishment for the student!





Region 3

Kikendawt Kinoomaadii Gamig (KKG) School Mascot!

In July 2023, Dokis First Nation held a mascot contest in the community. The school has a logo, but they have never created their own symbol or colors – something that best represents the school. There were five entries in total and each entry was voted on anonymously. The entry of Sabe was the clear winner and school staff agreed that this best represented the children and school, as a whole. The artist is Alexander Dokis. He created a beautiful picture of the land inside Sabe. In Dokis, Sabe is known as part of the 7 grandfather teachings – honesty. The students of KKG are encouraged to nurture their knowledge and their land. As such, the artwork also included their slogan "Knowledge Protectors." Congratulations to Alexander Dokis on winning the mascot contest. KKG is excited to show case its symbol in the community and on school trips!

Region 4

Munsee Delaware Language Updates and coming events!

This July, people from three Munsee speaking communities gathered in Princeton, New Jersey for four days of learning. As part of the original homelands, or Lunaapahkiing, communities coordinated the with Princeton University, and the Institute for Advanced Study. The event allowed space for Munsee language teachers from the communities to continue conversation about resource development, language revitalization and supporting language learners.

Over the four days, community members from Munsee-Delaware, Eelunaapeewi Lahkehwiit, and Stockbridge-Munsee (Wisconsin) were able to take part in language learning with connections to traditional cultural practices. Learners were able to take part in quill work, medicine gathering, gardening, canoeing, and cooking, all while using the Munsee language.





NII NDAHLOHKE / I WORK: MEET THE ARTISTS AND CURATORS Saturday, September 30

On September 30th, at the Art gallery of Windsor-Essex, there will be a gathering of artists who contributed to the artwork in "Nii Ndahloke (I work)." The book explores the work done by students at the Mount Elgin Residential School in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. The artists are from Munsee Delaware and Eelunaapeewi Lahkehwiit.

In partnership with Learning Bird, history and language were documented through film at the Longwoods Conservation Area. Some of the work was filmed at an important Musee historical landmark, the Logan-Dolson cabin, as well as on trails in the park.

School staff at secondary and elementary schools in the AES recently took part in training on the assignment of Ontario Education Numbers (OENs) for their students. The training is offered annually, and this year we welcomed 12 school staff in total.

Curious about what an OEN is?

The OEN is a unique numerical identifier assigned to students.

- It is a nine-digit number
- It is randomly-generated and assigned
- It is tied to each student's personal information and is retained for life

The OEN application, policies and procedures were designed to protect personal information. By law, the OEN is to be used only for educational purposes.

Why does the OEN matter to the AES?

When the KEB Student Consent Form is filled out, it is important to include the OEN on the form because it enables the sharing of data to the KEB, which helps inform the development of programs and resources for AES students.
