








Director of Education




Long Lake #58 First Nation

<u>Aundeck Omni Kaning</u>

Congratulations go out to Aundeck Omni Kaning First Nation who held a "Meet 'n Greet," at their newly updated and renovated tutoring centre, Enji Kinomagziwad Gamik (Where You Teach Building). Families and students gathered and celebrated the rejuvenated and reactivated elementary tutoring program on Monday, November 20, 2023. Some of the updates include new outdoor signage, new carpets and furniture, a renovated washroom and a fresh coat of paint throughout. Students from Grades 1-8 are able to access tutoring assistance each week from Monday to Thursday.



Whitefish River First Nation

On November 1, 2023, students, staff and families of Shawanosowe School in Whitefish River First Nation gathered to remember and honour the spirits of their ancestors as they celebrated Taasewang (All Souls Day). Students made wreaths in class and on November 1, the school bus was loaded, and the students made the trip to the local cemeteries. Here, the students met with their families and were able to lay their wreaths, along with odemin, semaa and ziizibaakwadoons. Afterwards, they gathered for a traditional feast of giigoonh, manoomin, and kosimaan (squash).

This celebration is part of Shawanosowe School's Niigaan Gdizhaami Fund Project, "Honouring the Gifts Around Us." The project supports the opportunity for students, families and the school community to remember their ancestors and shared history by hosting ceremonies and community feasts, and by sharing knowledge, stories, practices and language between generations.

School staff at secondary and elementary schools in the AES recently took part in training on the assignment of Ontario Education Numbers (OENs) for their students. The training is offered annually, and this year we welcomed 12 school staff in total.

Curious about what an OEN is?

The OEN is a unique numerical identifier assigned to students.

- It is a nine-digit number
- It is randomly-generated and assigned
- It is tied to each student's personal information and is retained for life

The OEN application, policies and procedures were designed to protect personal information. By law, the OEN is to be used only for educational purposes.

Why does the OEN matter to the AES?

When the KEB Student Consent Form is filled out, it is important to include the OEN on the form because it enables the sharing of data to the KEB, which helps inform the development of programs and resources for AES students.

Artwork submissions must be accompanied by a completed entry form and must reflect the theme of the forum: "Leading in a Good Way."


