- Discussions for the KEB to offer AQ courses related to teaching Ojibwe and teaching Lunaape.






LOOKING FORWARD: The next Indigenous Language Teachers Circle will take place in February 2024, on Manitoulin Island.

## Professional Development

The development of the Ezhi Kendmang Anishnaabe Naadziwin (EKAN) program has evolved over three years. A new call out for interested participants for the 2023-2024 year went out in the fall. The program is intended to be implemented in partnership with a PFN and a school board.

A team consisting of the First Nation, the Regional Education Coordinator, a facilitator, local Elder, and board lead - may customize the delivery of the materials to the region where the program is taking place. The program name translates to "Sharing the Knowledge of the People". This offers a foundation of learning and relationship building for all participants.

LOOKING FORWARD: Planning teams will be meeting in January and February 2024 to move implementation forward.

Youth Council Ogimaa-Kwe Cailen Hanzlik attended the workshop with council members Daynara Cyr, Jade Goulais, James Forneri, and Carson Norton-Sutherland. Turtle Concepts kicked-off the youth's Friday evening in high energy with special guests, Emma Morrison (Miss World Canada), Tia Nootchtai (Miss Ontario) and Mekwaa, who is a recent inductee into the Indigenous Athletics Hall of Fame.

Throughout the gathering, Youth Council members learned about what confidence is and how to express confidence in a healthy way. The group worked through some difficult dialogue with questions like "When do we get to be proud?" and talking about how to handle comments and criticisms from others.

The Turtle Concepts team spoke about how important it is for everyone to contribute to "reinventing Indigenous stereotypes" by walking with our heads high and being confident!

The group acknowledged that it is not always easy to positively express confidence. Many Anishinabek are shy or might suppress confidence as a result of trauma or situations that never allowed their confidence to grow.

The AES Youth Council members in attendance displayed incredible commitment to the workshop, showing that they each have a strong voice, that they are respectful, knowledgeable, and proud of their culture, and that they are dedicated to expressing themselves in positive and healthy ways.

Miigwech to the entire Turtle Concepts team for delivering a fantastic workshop - and chi-miigwech to the AES Youth Council for making it even more fantastic!

School staff at secondary and elementary schools in the AES recently took part in training on the assignment of Ontario Education Numbers (OENs) for their students. The training is offered annually, and this year we welcomed 12 school staff in total.

#### Curious about what an OEN is?

The OEN is a unique numerical identifier assigned to students.

- It is a nine-digit number
- It is randomly-generated and assigned
- It is tied to each student's personal information and is retained for life

The OEN application, policies and procedures were designed to protect personal information. By law, the OEN is to be used only for educational purposes.

#### Why does the OEN matter to the AES?

When the KEB Student Consent Form is filled out, it is important to include the OEN on the form because it enables the sharing of data to the KEB, which helps inform the development of programs and resources for AES students.
