



Implementation of the Master Education Agreement 2022-2023

The Master Education Agreement (MEA) was signed by the Kinoomaadziwin Education Body (KEB), the Participating First Nations (PFNs), and Ontario in 2017. The Agreement establishes a new relationship between the Parties, focused on student success and well-being for all Anishinabek students of the Anishinabek Education System (AES) and the provinciallyfunded education system.

A Multi-Year Action Plan (MYAP) was developed to support the implementation of the Agreement. It outlines 14 projects and initiatives that will be carried out from 2021-2024. The following infographic provides a summary of the achievements and outcomes from the second year of the MYAP, from September 2022 until August 2023.

Research and Evaluation

In August 2023, the KEB completed a five-year evaluation of the MYAP. The final report for the five-year evaluation presented 29 recommendations in nine areas of study. Student Services


